| Historical Accuracy | <p>All previous items AND - the entry is either an exact replication of a medieval recipe or is a plausible medieval beverage based on known ingredients/processes. - the documentation demonstrates in-depth understanding of how medieval beverages are made and how medieval and modern ingredients/processes produce different outcomes.</p> | <p>All previous items AND - final product uses all medieval processes and ingredients AND documentation includes a discussion of how the medieval processes differ from modern processes as well as an analysis of how the alternative options would have changed the outcome.</p> | <p>All previous items AND - entry demonstrates an understanding of the processes and ingredients used in the middle ages and how they differ from modern processes and/or ingredients.</p> | <p>All previous items AND - documentation discusses any historical processes and ingredients used to create the entry.</p> | <p>Beverage type/style is clearly labelled. | Difficulty | <p>Entry uses entirely medieval processes and ingredients for all aspects of beverage creation.</p> | <p>Entry is based on a medieval recipe using a primary or secondary source, following the process outlined in the recipe as closely as possible.</p> | <p>Entrant follows mostly medieval creation procedures and uses medieval ingredients.</p> | <p>Entrant uses a combination of modern and medieval processes and ingredients.</p> | <p>Entrant uses modern techniques and modern materials to produce a simple beverage.</p> | <p>Entrant uses a pre-packaged kit with no substitutions made.</p> |

| Craftsmanship | Entry exhibits all of the correct characteristics of its medieval counterpart: clarity, color, carbonation level, aroma, and flavor are all the epitome of a similar beverage of the stated time period, locale, and style. | Entry exhibits most of the correct characteristics of its medieval counterpart: clarity, color, carbonation level, aroma, and/or flavor are correct for a similar beverage of the stated time period, locale, and style. | Entry exhibits some of the correct characteristics of its medieval counterpart: clarity, color, carbonation level, aroma, and/or flavor are approximate for a similar beverage of the stated time period, locale, and style. | Entry exhibits one or two of the correct characteristics of its medieval counterpart: clarity, color, carbonation level, aroma, or flavor may be reminiscent of a similar beverage for the stated time period, locale, and style. | A flawed, but potable, beverage bearing little resemblance to a beverage of the stated style, locale, or time period. | Entry is unpleasant to drink and bears no resemblance to a beverage of the stated style, locale, or time period. |
| Creativity | Entrant: - developed their own interpretation of a medieval beverage based on multiple primary or secondary sources and uses a majority of, or only, medieval practices; OR - was able to combine medieval ingredients and practices in a manner that replicates a beverage specific to a time, place, and culture, but is not itself based on a primary or secondary source. | Entrant created their own recipe, putting together a logical combination of medieval ingredients and processes, to create a medieval beverage, showing some degree of innovation. | Entrant developed their own interpretation of a medieval recipe, based on a primary or secondary medieval source, and used methods based in medieval practices. | Entrant developed their own interpretation of a medieval recipe and based some portion of its execution on medieval practice. | Entrant followed a readily available interpretation of a medieval recipe or a modern recipe replicating a medieval beverage with no innovation. | Entrant followed a modern recipe. |
